Shuttle Crew Remembered

Space shuttle flights had become so routine it was quite a shock to see the headlines: Columbia is Lost. The seven member STS-107 crew, consisting of Commander Rick D. Husband, Pilot William C. McCool and Mission Specialists Kalpana Chawla, David M. Brown, Laurel B. Clark, Michael P. Anderson, and Payload Specialist Ilan Ramon were remembered in a moment of silence by CMARC members during the February 7th meeting.

Three of the STS-107 crew were licensed radio amateurs and their biographies, as provided by NASA, detail the spirit of excellence these individuals demonstrated in their quest for scientific knowledge.

David M. Brown - KC5ZTC (Technician)

Brown joined the Navy after his internship at the Medical University of South Carolina. Upon completion of flight surgeon training in 1984, he reported to the Navy Branch Hospital in Adak, Alaska, as Director of Medical Services.

In 1988, he was the only flight surgeon in a ten-year period to be chosen for pilot training. He was ultimately designated a naval aviator in 1990 in Beeville, Texas, ranking number one in his class.

Selected by NASA in April 1996, Brown reported to the Johnson Space Center in August 1996. Having completed two years of training and evaluation, he is eligible for flight assign-



ment as a mission specialist. He was initially assigned to support payload development for the International Space Station, followed by the astronaut support team responsible for orbiter cockpit setup, crew strap-in, and landing recovery. Dave Brown flew aboard STS-107 and logged 15 days, 22 hours, and 20 minutes in space.

Kalpana Chawla - KD5ESI (Technician)

In 1988, Kalpana Chawla started work at NASA Ames Research Center (cont'd on page 3)

Ziegenbein Nominations

Yep, it's that time of year again! Time to get your nominations in for the annual Ziegenbein Award, which are *due before March 15*. Each year, CMARC honors the member who has contributed the most to CMARC and/or Amateur Radio in general, during the preceding year.

This award was created in honor of Ralph Ziegenbein (W8PLP [SK]), an active CMARC member and avid Amateur Radio enthusiast. Ralph, who was known in the Lansing area as "Mr. Ham Radio," passed away in 1960.

Following his death, an award was established in his honor, and the following year, Gordon Main (W8OCK) became CMARC's first recipient of the Ziegenbein Award.

The recognition takes the form of a plaque, which is presented at the annual Ladies Night Banquet held in May. The Ziegenbein Committee, which selects the nominee to re-

ceive the award, consists of the last three recipients: Pam Denomee (KB8PSF), Chairman; James "Erv" Bates (W8ERV); and James Kenyon (KC8DJH).

Remember the deadline for nominations is March 15, 2003. (Per Ziegenbein Rules listed below.)

Ziegenbein Award Rules

1. The recipient must be a current member of CMARC.
2. Nominations are to be made in writing, in your own words, stating your nominee's contributions to CMARC and Amateur Radio. NO chain letters will be accepted.
3. All nominations are to be kept secret until the award is pre-

sented.

4. All nominations are to be mailed.
5. The same person can receive the award more than once.
6. The committee shall consist of the last three recipients; the senior member shall be the chairman.
7. All nominations are to be closely checked and discussed by the committee.
8. If the committee feels the nominees are not deserving, the award does not have to be given that year.
9. Nominations are to be submitted **BEFORE MARCH 15** so the committee can make the selection and have the plaque engraved.
10. The recipient will be announced at the annual Ladies Night Banquet.

(The above rules were revised by Currin Skutt (W8FSZ) and were submitted to the CMARC Board for their approval. The Board and membership approved these rules on October 6, 2000)

Amateur Radio and the Space Shuttle Program

Owen Garriott (W5LFL) pioneered the use of ham radio from Earth orbit during his "spare time" on shuttle flight STS-9.

Since that first voyage into space, NASA has continued to see the usefulness of bringing ham radios into space, and astronauts have been able to speak to hams on earth on dozens of shuttle flights.

The **Space Amateur Radio Experiment (SAREX)**, sponsored jointly by the American Radio Relay League (ARRL), the Radio Amateur Satellite Corporation (AMSAT) and NASA, is a long-running program that uses amateur radio equipment on board the Space Shuttle to involve students in exchanging questions and answers with astronauts in orbit.

Students in hundreds of different classrooms across the country are able to ask the astronauts questions about space flight and the experiments being conducted on the mission. It also allows for communication with amateur radio operators on the ground. No Amateur Radio gear was aboard the Columbia for this mission.

in the area of powered-lift computational fluid dynamics. Her research concentrated on simulation of complex air flows encountered around aircraft such as the Harrier in "ground-effect."

Following completion of this project, she supported research in mapping of flow solvers to parallel computers, and testing of these solvers by carrying out powered lift computations.

Selected by NASA in December 1994, Kalpana Chawla reported to the Johnson Space Center in March 1995 as an astronaut candidate in the 15th Group of Astronauts.

Her assignments included work on development of Robotic Situational Awareness Displays and testing space shuttle control software in the Shuttle Avionics Integration Laboratory. She flew on STS-87 (1997) and STS-107 (2003) and logged 30 days, 14 hours and 54 minutes in space.

Laurel Clark - KC5ZSU (Technician)

During medical school, she did active duty training with the Diving Medicine Department at the Naval

Experimental Diving Unit in March 1987.

She made numerous deployments, including one overseas to the Western Pacific, practiced medicine in austere environments, and flew on multiple aircraft. Her squadron won the Marine Attack Squadron of the year for its successful deployment. She was then assigned as the Group Flight Surgeon for the Marine Aircraft Group (MAG 13).

Prior to her selection as an astronaut candidate she served as a Flight Surgeon for the Naval Flight Officer advanced training squadron (VT-86) in Pensacola, Florida. Selected by NASA in April 1996, Dr. Clark reported to the Johnson Space Center in August 1996. After completing two years of training and evaluation, she was qualified for flight assignment as a mission specialist. From July 1997 to August 2000, Dr. Clark worked in the Astronaut Office Payloads/Habitability Branch. Dr. Clark flew aboard STS-107 and logged 15 days, 22 hours, and 20 minutes in space.

perienced Mark's caring and kindness this past fall. Mark happened to overhear that I had purchased a new HF rig but had no antennas in the air. He graciously volunteered to help

A few days later, there we were, calculating wire lengths, cutting, fitting, and planning. That first day, we completed all of that and hung the quad band dipole between a couple trees to let the wire set.

The next week, Mark was back with his analyzer. We tuned the elements and got it into the air. Then he came inside, tuned up and jumped into a contest. After making several contacts on different bands, Mark took his logs and left. Though we communicated several times after that, I saw him only once more.

Born May 18, 1962, Mark was only 41 at the time of his death. His mother, Marilyn, was 73. Unconfirmed sources indicated that Marilyn died on her son David's 49th birthday and her and George's 53rd wedding anniversary.

Russ Fitzgerald, N8FZ, a long time family friend shared some thoughts about Mark and his family with me. Russ has known Mark since he was about six or seven years old. Both boys' parents were Boy Scout leaders so they spent a lot of time together.

Russ recounts that his dad had an old Hallicrafters short wave radio that he and Mark found fascinating. They would listen and wonder what it would be like to

actually talk to people in some of those places they heard.

In the mid- to late-seventies, Mark began showing an interest in CB radios. He was active in several groups and began to learn more about radio. Around 1978, Russ tested and earned both his Novice and General tickets. Then in the early eighties, Russ convinced Mark to test.

In the meantime, Marilyn had been helping Mark study. During those days, someone holding a General Class ticket could administer the Novice code exam. So Russ tested

Mark and he passed!  
Then Marilyn said she

thought she had copied most of the code. Russ suggested he test her also. She accepted his offer and passed the Novice test as well.

Nine months later, Mark and Marilyn went to Detroit and tested at the FCC. They both came home with their Technician tickets.

Fondly, Russ recounted Mark's first HF DX contact. Apparently, Mark had picked up a Tempo One at a hamfest. The only real key he had was an old beat up Radio Shack key. But they were determined to let Mark make his first contact on his own ra-

dio at his own house.

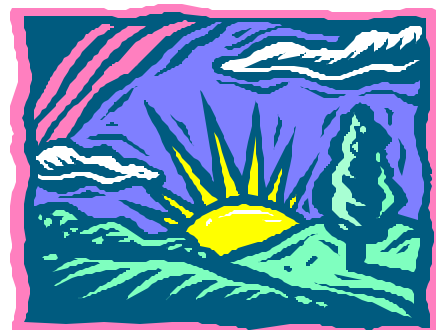
They set up and got on the air. They made contact with a station somewhere in or near the former USSR. Right in the middle, while Mark was trying to pass his information to the contact, the bearings fell out of his key!

Russ explains that, without blinking, Mark ran to get his old homemade practice key. That key was just a piece of bent metal attached to some boards and wires. Mark, Russ explained, yanked the wires off the key, stripped them with his fingernails and began touching them together to complete the QSO.

From so many fellow hams, I have heard stories of Mark's generosity and knowledge. Mark never seemed to take his hobby or his fellow hams for granted. He was always willing to help even with his busy schedule.

Both Mark and Marilyn were strong supporters of CMARC and the amateur radio community. The family asked that donations be made to CMARC. The Board is considering how best to memorialize these two popular individuals. Ideas to the Board are welcome.

How about making this a club event? You can submit your individual or multi-op scores under the name of the club and maybe bring home the club plaque. Hey, why not challenge another local area club or other groups within your club? Are there others in your club that would consider a mini expedition for a portable operation in one of the Michigan counties with minimal activity?? The name of the game is to have fun and make Michigan "Radio Active" on April 19th. Hope to hear you on the air!

Michigan QSO Party, sponsored by the Mad River Radio Club, will run from 1600Z April 19th until 0400Z April 20th. Stations may operate

the full 12 hours. (12 noon to 12 midnight local Michigan time on April 19)

*Modes and Categories:* Phone and CW on 80/40/20/15/10 meters.

***With your participation, this has the potential to be one of the best QSO parties in the country.***

*Single-op, multi-op, and mobile categories:* Single-op entries are categorized by output power, QRP (5W or less), Low Power (100W or less), and High Power (greater than 100W)

*Multipliers:* Work stations once per band and mode. Work other states and Michigan Stations. Work portables and mobiles again as they change county, state or province.

*Exchange:* Exchange QSO number and location (county for MI stations, state/province or "DX" for others).

*Suggested frequencies:* CW-3545, 7045, 14045, 21045, 28045; Phone-3850, 7225, 14250, 21300, 28450.

*Scoring:* One point per phone QSO, two points per CW QSO. Count multipliers once per mode. Multipliers are MI counties for all entries, plus states & provinces for MI entries only. Final score is total QSO points times total multipliers.

*Log Submittal:* Mail logs no later
