CMARC Meeting Minutes

Battle Creek, MI 49014 Phone: 269-964-3197 Email: bevolin@msn.com NEWINGTON, CT, Jan 19, 2004--The ARRL will ask the FCC to create a new entry-level Amateur Radio license that would include HF phone privileges without requiring a Morse code test. The League also will propose consolidating all current licensees into three classes, retaining the Element 1 Morse requirement--now 5 WPM--only for the highest class.

The ARRL Board of Directors overwhelmingly approved the plan January 16 during its Annual Meeting in Windsor, Connecticut. The proposalsdeveloped by the ARRL Executive Committee following a Board instruction last July-are in response to changes made in Article 25 of the international Radio Regulations at World Radiocommunication Conference 2003 (WRC-03).

They would continue a process of streamlining the amateur licensing structure that the FCC began more than five years ago but left unfinished in the Amateur Service license restructuring *Report and Order* (WT 98-143) that went into effect April 15, 2000.

The ARRL has addressed frequently asked questions (FAQs) concerning this proposal. "Change in the Amateur Radio Service in the US, especially license requirements and even more so when Morse is involved, has always been emotional," said ARRL First Vice President Joel Harrison, W5ZN, in presenting the Executive Committee's recommendations. "In fact, without a doubt, Morse is Amateur Radio's 'religious debate." The plan adopted by the Board departs only slightly from the Executive Committee's recommendations.

The "New" Novice

The entry-level license class--being called "Novice" for now--would require a 25-question written exam. It would offer limited HF CW/data and phone/image privileges on 80, 40, 15 and 10 meters as well as VHF and UHF privileges on 6 and 2 meters and on 222-225 and 430-450 MHz. Power output would be restricted to 100 W on 80, 40, and 15 meters and to 50 W on 10 meters and up, thus avoiding the need for the more complex RF safety questions in the Novice question pool.

"The Board sought to achieve balance in giving new Novice licensees the opportunity to sample a wider range of Amateur Radio activity than is available to current Technicians while retaining a motivation to upgrade," said ARRL CEO David Sumner, K1ZZ. "It was also seen as important to limit the scope of privileges so the exam would not have to include material that is inappropriate at the entry level."

As an introduction to Amateur Radio, the Novice license served successfully for most of its 50-year history. The FCC has not issued new Novice licenses since the 2000 license restructuring, however. Under the ARRL plan, current Novice licensees -- now the smallest and least active group of radio amateurs -would be grandfathered to the new entry-level class without further testing. Anticipating assertions that the new plan would "dumb down" Amateur Radio licensing, Harrison said those currently holding a ticket often perceive the level of complexity to have been greater when they were first licensed than it actually was. "Quite frankly," he said, "if you review the questions presented in our license (cont'd on page 3)

(cont'd from page 1) manuals throughout the years, you will be surprised how they compare to those of today."

Technicians and Generals The middle group of licensees--Technician, Tech Plus (Technician with Element 1 credit) and General--would be consolidated into a new General license that no longer would require a Morse examination. Current Technician and Tech Plus license holders automatically would gain current General class privileges without additional testing. The current Element 3 General examination would remain in place for new applicants. ARRL already has proposed additional phone privileges for Generals in its "Novice refarming" petition, RM-10413, but the FCC has not yet acted on that petition.

Morse Code Testing Retained for Extra
At the top rung, the Board indicated that
it saw no compelling reason to change
the Amateur Extra class license requirements. The ARRL plan calls on the
FCC to combine the current Advanced
and Amateur Extra class licensees into
Amateur Extra, because the technical
level of the exams passed by these licensees is very similar.

New applicants for Extra would have to pass a 5 WPM Morse code examina-

tion, but the written exam would stay the same. The League's plan calls for current Novice, Tech Plus and General class licensees to receive lifetime Element 1 (5 WPM Morse) credit.

"This structure provides a true entry-level license with HF privileges to promote growth in the Amateur Service," Harrison said. "It also simplifies the FCC database by conforming to the current Universal Licensing System (ULS) structure and does not mandate any modifications to it."

Sumner concurred. "The Board started out by recognizing that three license classes was the right number when looking down the road 10 or 15 years," he said. "We need a new entry-level license."

"On the other hand, there's nothing particularly wrong with the existing Extra class license," he continued. "The change in the international regulations notwithstanding, the Board felt that the highest level of accomplishment in the FCC's amateur licensing structure should include basic Morse capability."

Sumner and Harrison say the current Technician entry-level ticket

provides little opportunity to experience facets of ham radio beyond repeater operation. "The quality of that experience," Sumner said, "often depends on the operator's location."

Among other advantages, Sumner said the plan would allow new Novices to participate in HF SSB emergency nets on 75 and 40 meters as well as on the top 100 kHz of 15 meters. The new license also could get another name, Sumner said. "We're trying to recapture the magic of the old Novice license, but in a manner that's appropriate for the 21st century."

Proposal Includes "Novice Refarming" Band Plan

The overall proposed ARRL license restructuring plan would more smoothly integrate HF spectrum privileges across the three license classes and would incorporate the "Novice refarming" plan the League put forth nearly two years ago in a Petition for Rule Making (RM-10413). The FCC has not yet acted on the ARRL plan, which would alter the current HF subbands. The Novice refarming proposal would eliminate the 80, 40 and 15-meter Novice/ Technician Plus CW subbands as such and reuse that spectrum in part to expand phone/image subbands on 80 and 40 meters.

The ARRL license restructuring design calls for no changes in privileges for Extra and General class licensees on 160, 60, 30, 20, 17 or 12 meters. Novice licensees would have no access to those bands.

As most of you know, FCC has announced it will issue a Notice of Proposed Rule Making (NPRM) on BPL very soon. At the time the NPRM is publicized, you will have additional opportunity to write FCC to protest. The Commission has asserted BPL will be done in a manner that will avoid interference, but they are leaving policing of this to the Power Companies. My only thought is that self-policing is great when it is actually done.

Isn't this BPL thing sort of like hiring the fox to guard the hen house? The Power Companies have proven time and time again as an industry that they cannot or will not manage interference

caused by broken insulators, capacitors, etc. Will this all change?


In reality, provided FCC acts aggressively to prevent interference, as they say they will, we will not be in bad shape. I'm not holding my breath for long, though.

Keep your eyes on arrl.org and on further E-mail information from me. Each source will advise you when and how comments can be made.

In the meantime, I strongly encourage any member who is experiencing interference from a faulty power line to write (USPS or E-mail) the company and complain. Be as specific as possible. Above all, keep copies of your correspondence with them. If they do not respond within a reasonable time, write again. Keep a copy. If you do not get a timely response or if the problem is not fixed, please send a copy of your file to Riley Hollingsworth. Include a letter explaining the situation. Let's get the power companies on notice that they have to keep their acts clean.

AMATEUR RADIO SPECTRUM PROTE C-TION ACT

The new year 2004 is here. Congress is back in session. It is time to renew our campaign to gain sponsors for the Spectrum Protection Act. I've written about this several times previously, but if you need further in-

Ask them to co-sponsor HR 713 (House) and S 537 (Senate), the Amateur Radio Spectrum Protection Act as it has been introduced into each of these houses. For sample letters, go to: http://www.arrl.org/govrelations/arspa.html#write. Please personalize your letter by adding an example of a fairly recent public service/emergency communications activity that was held in your state or the Representatives' District.

To learn your Representative's name and address, go to: http://www.house.gov/writerep/. To learn your Senators' names and addresses, go to: http://www.senate.gov/contacting/index.cfm. It is possible in most cases to send E-mail letters to Representatives and Senators right from the page that has their names and addresses. Please copy me on your letters and any replies you receive. I will forward these to our lobbyist in DC for his follow-up.

If you have written before, please do it again. There is an exception to this request. It would not be correct to ask a Representative or Senator who has already co-signed the bill to do this again. It would be nice to send a thank you note to them, but not one to ask them to do what they've already done. Date /Time: Michigan QSO Party, sponsored by the Mad

River Radio Club, from 1600Z April 17th until 0400Z April 18th. Stations may operate the full 12 hours. (12 noon to 12 midnight local Michigan time on April 17)

Modes and Categories: Phone and CW on 80/40/20/15/10 meters. Single-op, multi-op, and mobile categories. Single-op entries are categorized by output power, QRP (5W or less), Low Power (100W or less), and High Power (greater than 100W)

Multipliers: Work stations once per band and mode. Work other states and Michigan Stations. Work portables and mobiles again as they change county, state or province.

Exchange: Exchange QSO number and location (county for MI stations, state/province or "DX" for others).

Freqs: Suggested frequencies: CW-3545, 7045, 14045, 21045, 28045; Phone-3850, 7225, 14250, 21300, 28450.

Scoring: One point per phone QSO, two points per CW QSO. Count multipliers once per mode. Multipliers are MI counties for all entries, plus states & provinces for MI entries only. Final score is total QSO points times total multipliers.

My Story, Part 2, Dan Harger. W8BCI

Last time, we had moved to Elkton in the thumb area of Michigan, Dad had the Methodist church there. This time he had two churches, one in Elkton and the other in a small farm crossroads community south of town. A lot stands out about this time in memory.

Dad was repairing radios and the local movie theater had these large sound systems that needed repair. The movie theater was owned and operated by Oliver Willett. Oliver would call Dad and he would go over and repair the system. Now in return for these maintenance trips, Oliver gave our family free passes to the shows; our friends thought we really had it made and we did!

But that wasn't all! Oliver Willett was a nut modeler of rubber powered model airplanes. Oliver designed and built his own planes and had a collection of models sketched on cards on the wall of his model room; models that had been lost in thermals and never returned! These card sketches were beautiful and had the date and time that the models were lost entered on each card.

Oliver didn't stop there. He also owned a beautiful, yellow Piper Cub with black details, a full-sized airplane! On this plane, I got my first airplane ride taking off from a farmer's field outside of Elkton that was lightly covered with snow, wow! Neat! Oliver would fly over Elkton and throw out a large parachute for us kids to chase after and return to him. We had a lot of fun doing this in the summer

days of the late 30's.

Back to radio...Dad and Bill Morford from the town of Pigeon made a radio program about Christian morals and titled the episodes 'The Methodist Radio Parish." On one of the first episodes when I was ten, they needed a young person to cry in one of the parts. I was elected and cried on cue with real tears, truly a Ham was born! Later in 1946 when they put a small AM station on the air in Flint, Michigan, the call letters used were WMRP for Methodist Radio Parish.

At this time in Elkton, we had a huge parsonage and I, at this time, had my own bedroom. Dad had his radio shop in the upstairs, Mom also did her ironing there. My radio experience at this time was caught up with radio episodes that I would listen to after school each night. Jack Armstrong, Captain Midnight and Little Orphan Annie were played in succession with me sitting in front of the set captivated! While sitting there, listening in front of this console set with ornate trim, I would run my fingernails up and down this trim and eventually loosened the trim to the extent that Dad had to glue it back in place!

We were in Elkton when on December 7, 1941, Pearl Harbor was attacked, that was a fearful day for us and the world!

Next month: I take the National Radio Correspondent radio course and really get started in radio!

(cont'd from page 5) service and block SPAM from being sent through it. To you I've suggested it is better for each person to put a SPAM blocking program on their computer rather than to let an ISP do the filtering.

The reason is that when you and I set the filter on our own computers, we are the ones who define exactly what SPAM is to us. When we do this, mail that we define as NOT being SPAM gets through. When an ISP does the filtering, SPAM is whatever a worker at the ISP considers it to be.

The risk is substantial that the block will kick messages we want to receive out of the system so we don't even know they were sent.

The following quote from another reflector to which I belong clearly shows what I mean. I have removed the identity of the sender (a former work colleague of mine) and the name of the ISP. He is totally frustrated over the ISP setting the filter standards which cause him to lose wanted E-mail.

"I'm getting testier about this mail filtering thing. [His ISP] constructed a Filtered Mail folder (without my asking). The things I know are missing from [name of the reflector] don't go there. If they must filter, put it there so I can selectively handle it.

All I find in the Filtered Mail folder are what I can only call the "Do What, With What and To Whom" stuff (at what size and at what cost). Others have reported frustration with various "help" desks."

The arrl.net forwarding service is not the cause or source of SPAM. There is no question that by the very nature of the patterns used to assign callsigns, amateurs are ripe targets for SPAMMERS. THANKS!

I thank each of you who have written your support as well as suggestions for the new restructuring proposal and for the work I've been doing. Your suggestions and other input -- yes, your disagreements -- are key to whatever I may do to benefit Amateur Radio and you. Keep up writing.

MANY NON-MEMBERS AND SOME MEMBERS ARE SURPRIZED Why are many non-members and even members surprised when they learn they cannot carry the ARRL banner if they are not members? Many non-members are surprised to learn that I do not represent them. I certainly try to represent the best interests of Amateur Radio and ARRL members, and if this happens to include non-members, fine. I feel no need to bend over backwards to acknowledge the thoughts and wishes of non-members.

Similarly, why would a non-member even consider they could become an ARRL banner carrier by receiving appointment as a DX card checker or any other appointment to a program sponsored by the League? This should not even be a consideration. One cannot have allegiance to a program of an organization to which they choose not to belong. It is this simple.

Soon after you elected me Director I began looking through the many member programs of the League as I had promised during my campaign. I'm still going through these to see if there are programs that ought to be deleted or modified. I quickly learned that the criteria for becoming an ARRL WAS QSL checker were rather loose. For one thing, there was no requirement that the checker need be an ARRL member. This clearly was a slip-up. You can bet I

jumped on this. WAS QSL checkers now need to be ARRL members. The coming ARRL Mentor program, the DXCC QSL checker program and others are further examples of appointments that are or will be available only to members.

The League exists because of the support of its members. Its members, not non-members, are the ones who should benefit from the recognition available through appointments.
