Ziegenbein Nominations

Yep, It's that time of year already—time to get your nominations in for the annual Ziegenbein Award, which are due before March 15th. Each year, CMARC honors the member who has contributed the most to CMARC and/or Amateur Radio in general, during the preceding year. This award is made in honor of Ralph Ziegenbein/W8PLP (SK), an active CMARC member and avid Amateur Radio enthusiast. Ralph, who was known in the Lansing area as "Mr. Ham Radio", passed away in 1960. Following his death, an award was established in his honor. The following year, Gordon Main/W8OCK became CMARC's first recipient. The recognition takes the form of a plaque, which is presented at the annual Ladies Night Banquet held in May. The Ziegenbein Committee, which selects the nominee to receive the award, consists of the last three recipients of it. They are James Kenyon/KC8DJH, Gregg Mulder/WB8LZG-chairman, and Joe Denomme/N8VYS.

Please send all nominations **BEFORE MARCH 15TH** to Ziegenbein Nominations: Gregg C. Mulder/WB8LZG; 7251 Saratoga Way, Dimondale, MI. 48821. Remember, the deadline for nominations is March 15th, 2006. (Per Ziegenbein Rules listed below).

1. The Recipient must be a CURRENT member of CMARC.
2. Nominations are to be made in writing, in your own words, stating nominee's contributions to CMARC and Amateur Radio. No chain letters to be accepted.
3. All nominations are to be kept secret until award is presented.
4. All nominations are to be mailed.
5. The same person can receive the award more than once.
6. The committee shall consist of the last three recipients; the senior member shall be chairman.
7. All nominations are to be closely checked and discussed by the committee.
8. If the committee feels the nominees are not deserving, the award does not have to be given that year.
9. Nominations are to be submitted **BEFORE MARCH 15th** so the committee can make the selection and have the plaque engraved.
10. The recipient will be announced at the annuals Ladies Night Banquet.

(The above rules were revised by Currin Skutt/W8FSZ and were submitted to the CMARC Board for their approval. The Board and membership approved the revised rules on October 6, 2000.)

Sick or in Hospital – Rocky Beckner (K8DRB) is still recuperating at his parent's home and has been heard on the 146.700 MHz repeater recently.

Don Tillitson has had cataracts removed. For the record, Don is seeing things right side up.

Upgrades and New Licenses – None

Old Business – Don Devendorf (W8EGI) reported that membership secretary John Ingraham (NG8L) has been working nights and therefore has been unable to attend CMARC meetings. Don will receive dues payments and turn records over to John.

Dan reported helping several repeaters in nearby towns and seems glad to do it. The interference problem on the 145.39 MHz repeater seems to have disappeared but is expected back. Don Tillitson (WB8NUS) reported that the LCDRA address is P.O. Box 70052 Lansing, MI 48908. Ralph Chapman (WA8NHD) had a suggestion which was not audible on tape.

Gregg Mulder (WB8LZG) announced that the licensing class, which starts January 21st at the MSU Engineering Building, still has openings. Flyers are still being put out.

Roger Barnhill (AB8RX) is trying to get somebody from MSU to present satellite operation at the next CMARC meeting.

We agreed to hold Field Day at Kamp Kiwanis. It's the highest point in the country and has worked out well in the past. DeAnna Barnhill (KD8BDI) will be in charge of food again and may make an Olympic sized meatloaf.

CONTESTING FOR BEGINNERS

Ever wonder how those contesters we see at Field Day and other contests get to be such good operators? Well it doesn't just happen overnight. It takes practice, and the easiest way to get this practice is to jump right in to a contest and start making QSOs. However before you begin, lets do a bit of pre-contest homework.

Choosing a contest. If you have never done any contesting before you may not want to start out with one of the big ones that go all weekend long. There are several short contests throughout the year called "sprints", that only run for 4 hours at a time. A look through the "contest" page in QST will reveal many of these sprints every month. Because a sprint is only 4 hours, you don't have to devote an entire weekend to the contest. Just one evening. This will also go over better with your family. (you'll still have time to mow the lawn or clean out the garage!) There are also some less competitive contests such as "Straight Key Night" where the object is not to see how many stations you can work, but rather to have a pleasant rag chew using a hand key with others doing the same. This is a great contest for both Old Timer and Novice alike.

Another way to get your "feet wet" is to come out and join the club Field Day effort. There is a special consideration for the newcomer in the form of GOTA, or Get On The Air station. The purpose of this station is to give the newcomer a spot to check it out without the high stress and tension level. Also, watching some of the more experienced operators at F.D. is a wonderful way to gain insight into contesting. There are some things that will help make your contest experience a more positive one. They are simple but often ignored.

1. Get plenty of rest and eat right.
2. Look up and read the rules.
3. Write down the contest "exchange" so you'll have it right in front of you.
4. Listen in on the top Ops to hear how they handle their QSOs. The good ones definitely have a style and rhythm.
5. Find a contest "Elmer" to sit with you for the first hour or two to help guide you. They can give you pointers and suggestions that are very valuable.
6. On phone, be sure to use proper phonetics, not cute ones. It will aid in the other stations being able to get your information quickly and accurately .
7. On CW, don't send faster than you can receive. Don't be afraid to ask the other Op to QRS (Slow Down). Most Ops will gladly slow down when asked to.
8. If you can't find a contest "Elmer" try looking for a contest "Buddy". Get together and have one person operate the radio while the other logs, and then switch off every hour. You'll be surprised at how much fun you can have and your skills will quickly improve.
9. Remember to " HAVE FUN! " That's what it's all about. If you get tired, take a break or call it a night. It's just a contest. There's always another one next weekend. Remember to enjoy, that's what contesting is all about.

Well, I hope many of you will give contesting a try.

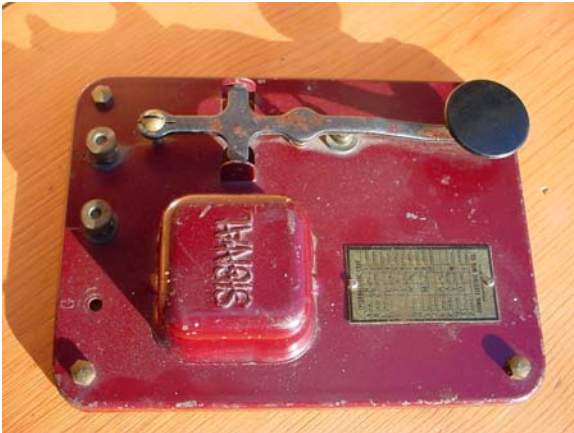
Perhaps you'll be the next super contester. What have you got to lose.
