November Key of the Month


The Key of the Month for November is another KOB (key on board) practice set made for the Army during the WW2 era, by Signal Electric here in Menominee, Mich. These were used in pairs for code practice, as this model also has a small metal plate with all the letters of the code embossed to use as a quick reference for the beginner. This key is very special to me as it was my very first key. Back in 1971, my high school friend, Jim Lundy and I were studying up for our novice tickets. Our High School electronics teacher, James Gilhouse, dug up several of these old keys from surplus somewhere, and gave one to each of us when we received our licenses. Mr. Gilhouse was not a ham himself, but was a terrific mentor to his students. He recognized the power of incentive and motivation to impact his student's lives, and steered me to a career in electronics, computers, and radio. Jim Lundy became WN8KXZ, and I got WN8LZG. I used this key as a novice, and for many years after. I did a so so refurbish job on it back in 1973, but the key has seen considerable use and abuse since then. Briefcase Portable by Gregg Mulder

I'd been experimenting with different antennas and radio combinations in an attempt to find a good portable station that could go anywhere with me. The "radio" part was easy. These days with all of the new miniature rigs on the market, a ham has quite a choice for a full featured all mode rig in a tiny package. I chose to use an Elecraft K-1 for the rig. It has 4 bands and an internal antenna tuner that works very well, plus the rig itself is very tiny and lightweight. Since I'm only running 4 or 5 watts, the power supply was small as well. I use a pack of 10 Ni-Mh batteries in series. The pack is rated at 2500 ma/hr and will power the radio for about 12 hours of constant use the antenna, well I'm a long time believer in a good 'ol dipole. However I needed to be able to get the aerial up with out the use of a fishin' pole or a slingshot. (it all has to go in a small briefcase remember) I finally settled on an improvised vertical. I used #22 gauge stranded wire, nice and flexible, not to heavy. I cut a 33' piece for the vertical element. Then soldered one end into the center pin of a female BNC chassis connector. For the "ground" side of the connector I put a lug to clip an alligator clip to. Then made a" Radial Pac" by cutting 2 radials to 1/4 wavelength for 40, 20,15 meters, then soldered one end of each to a large alligator clip. To get the vertical up in the air, I planned on the "Armstrong" method. A 2 oz. fishing sinker tied to a 3' piece of nylon string, then thrown up into a near by tree, or over a pole. For feed line, I used RG-174u coax. (the small stuff) I know it's not the greatest in terms of loss, but It's light, very flexible, and easy to roll up into a small roll. Besides I was only using 30 feet. Was time for the test, I decided to test it all out "FD" emergency style. The CMARC meeting was coming up so that was it. I wanted to see how quickly I could get my station on the air and make contacts, and how quickly it could be put up and taken down. Friday night I put my "station" in the car, along with a folding table and lawn chair, and headed out to the Red Cross. I arrived at 7 P. M. Took the antenna out and stretched all the radials out in the parking lot. Then I threw the vertical up in the tree off to the side. The BNC connector was near ground level. The coax was attached and the radials were "clipped on" and spread out on the ground. I pulled out the chair, set up the rig, and started calling CQ at 7:10 PM on 40 meters. Not bad, 10 min. set up, but wasn't getting any answer to my call. I switched to 20 meters and tried again. This time I was rewarded with an answer from Jack, W7CNL in Boise, Idaho! Yes! We were 559 both ways, and had a nice chat. He was also running QRP with a Ten Tec Argonaut at 5 watts. QRP to QRP across the nation! Way Cool! True he did have a 5 element Yagi-Uda for an antenna, but my station was a success. We said our 73's at 7:20 PM. And I started dismantling the station. I unclipped the antenna, rolled up the coax, pulled my radiator out of the tree, folded up the lawn chair, put everything in the car and went into the meeting at 7:30. Now That's Portable! A few of the members were trickling in to the meeting and stopped by to check things out as I was operating, and I received several nice comments, also got someone to take a picture. All in all a good test, and very fun. I'll be trying out so other small and portable antennas in the near future and I'll let u know how they perform.

Because of a death in the family of the editor, copies of <u>The</u> <u>Scope</u> had to be distributed at the meeting, so Dick McGuire read minutes of the September meeting at this time. The secretary's report was accepted as corrected by Rocky Beckner (K8DRB). Moved by Rocky and seconded by DeAnna Barnhill (KD8BDI). As an update to discussion reported in the minutes, Don Tillitson (WB8NUS) announced that next year's Skywarn training cannot be held in April - no open dates.

Treasurer Don Devendorf (W8EGI) announced that his latest report was printed in <u>The Scope</u>, except that the credit union has cancelled the \$10 service charge. The charge had resulted from a series of misunderstandings. Don also reported that he had completed the annual registration. The report was accepted as printed, moved by Bernie Gaffney (N8PVZ) (subject to annual audit) and seconded by Don Tillitson (WB8NUS). Don then made the point that all expenses related to <u>The Scope</u> should be submitted to Don Hinkle (KD8DJH), current treasurer of LCDRA.

Roger Barnhill (AB8RX) recognized recipients of the CMARC Lifetime Achievement award, Don Defeyter (KC8CY) and Don Devendorf (W8EGI). Neither had been present at the recent picnic, when the other awards were handed out. Both received certificates and will be identified with a nameplate on a permanent plaque. The plaque will probably be mounted on a wall of the club station downstairs, since the Red Cross has a rule against items being mounted on walls. Don Tillitson will be in charge of the mounting.

New Business

Bob Berger (KB8RDN) initiated a discussion of the Sunday evening informational net, which doesn't always have a net control. If the scheduled net control is not present, anybody may feel free to assume net control. Roger Barnhill then asked for the net to be earlier than 8:30, but there seemed to be no agreement to change the time

Gregg Mulder (WB8LZG) announced his latest dx. Gregg claimed to be using a battery-powered, portable rig on cw, but rumor has it that Gregg really worked the dx on ssb, using a linear and 3-element beam. 2006 ARRL NOVEMBER SWEEPSTAKES RULES

1. Object: For stations in the United States and Canada (including territories and possessions) to exchange as many other US and Canadian stations as possible on 160, 80, 40, 20, 15 and 10 meter bands.

2. Date and Contest Period:

- 2.1. CW: First full weekend in November (November 4-6, 2006).
- 2.2. Phone: Third full weekend in November (November 18-20, 2006).
- 2.3. Contest Period: Begins 2100 UTC Saturday, ends 0300 UTC Monday.
- 2.4. Operate no more than 24 of the 30 hours.
 - 2.4.1. Off periods may not be less than 30 minutes in length.
- 2.4.2. Times off and on must be clearly noted in paper logs. Do not indicate off times in electronic log files. The log checking software calculates it.
- 2.4.3. Listening time counts as operating time.

3. Entry Categories:

- 3.1. Single Operator:
 - 3.1.1. QRP.
 - 3.1.2. Low Power.
- 3.1.3. High Power.
- 3.1.4. Unlimited—Packet assisted (no differentiated power levels)
- 3.2. Multioperator
- 3.2.1. Multi-Single only
- 3.2.1.1. Only 1 transmitted signal is permitted at any time.
- 3.2.1.2. No limitation on the number of band changes.
- 3.2.1.3. Spotting assistance is permissible.
- 3.3. School Club
- 3.3.1. There are three divisions to this category.
- 3.3.1.1. College and University

3.3.1.2. Technical School

- 3.3.1.3. Secondary and other School
- 3.3.2. School clubs compete as their own category.
- 3.3.3. Only currently enrolled regular students and faculty/staff of the institution are eligible to operate a school club entry. Alumni may "Elmer" but may not operate the station during the competition.
- 3.3.4. There is no distinction between Single and Multi operator stations or power levels in this category.
- 3.3.5. School clubs must operate from established stations located on the campus. No portable operation from a near-by contest station is allowed. A club may operate from a member's station only if no on-campus station exists.
- 3.3.6. Certificates will be awarded to the top scoring entry in each division of this category in each ARRL/RAC section and division.

4. Exchange: The required exchange consists of:

- 4.1. A consecutive serial number:
- 4.2. Precedence;
- 4.2.1. "Q" for Single Op QRP (5 Watts output or less);
- 4.2.2. "A" for Single Op Low Power (up to 150 W output);
- 4.2.3. "B" for Single Op High Power (greater than 150 W output);
- 4.2.4. "U" for Single Op Unlimited;
- 4.2.5. "M" for Multi-Op;
- 4.2.6. "S" for School Club;
- 4.3. Your Callsign;
- 4.4. Check (the last two digits of the year you were first licensed);
- 4.5. ARRL/RAC Section

(Example: NU1AW would respond to W1AW's call by sending: W1AW 123 B NU1AW 71 CT, which indicates QSO number 123, B for Single Op High Power, NU1AW, first licensed in 1971, and in the Connecticut section.)

5. Scoring:

- 5.1. QSO points: Count two points for each complete two-way QSO.
- 5.2. Multiplier: Each ARRL Section and RAC Section plus the Canadian NT (Northern Territories encompassing VE8 / VY1 / VY0) with a maximum number of 80.
 - 5.2.1. KP3 and KP4 are in the Puerto Rico Section.
 - 5.2.2. KV4/KP2 and KG4 stations are in the Virgin Islands Section.
 - 5.2.3. KH6 and other US possessions in the Pacific count as the Pacific Section.
- 5.3. Final score: Multiply QSO points (two per QSO) by the number of ARRL/RAC sections (plus NT VE8/VY1/VY0).

6. Miscellaneous:

- 6.1. Work each station only once, regardless of the frequency band.
- 6.2. Only one transmitted signal at any time is permitted.

7. Awards:

- 7.1. Certificates will be awarded to the top operator CW and Phone scores in each category ("A", "B", "Q", "U", "S" and "M") in each ARRL/RAC section and division.
- 7.2. All Overall and Divisional winners will be awarded a plaque recognizing their efforts. Plaques are either sponsored by groups of clubs or by the principal awards sponsor, Icom.

8. Submission:

- 8.1. Deadline for submission of CW entries is Wednesday December 6, 2006 Deadline for submission of Phone entries is Wednesday December 20, 2006. Entries emailed or postmarked after the deadline may be designated checklogs.
- 8.1.1. The CW and Phone mode are considered separate contests and must be submitted in separate envelopes or emails sent to the appropriate address.
- 8.1.2. Entries must be made on current ARRL entry forms or on a reasonable facsimile. Current forms may be downloaded in .pdf or ASCII format from www.arrl.org/contests/forms
- 8.2. Email entries for CW must be sent to SSCW@arrl.org and Phone to SSPhone@arrl.org
- 8.3. Cabrillo formatted logs can be submitted by logging onto the web application at www.b4h.net/cabforms and completing the required information.
- 8.4. Any entry that has been created using a computer for logging must be submitted in the Cabrillo log file format.
- 8.4.1. Files from word processing, spreadsheet programs or "bin" type logging program files are not valid or usable.
- 8.4.2. Any electronic file that is not submitted in required format will not be eligible for competition and awards.
- 8.4.3. A paper printout for a log that has been generated by a computer in lieu of the actual data file in the required format is not an acceptable substitute.
- 8.4.4. Paper logs that are entered into a logging program or computer after the contest are considered electronic logs and must include the required electronic file in the submission.
- 8.5. Hand written paper logs are acceptable entries. Any hand written paper log of 500 or more OSOs must include the required dupe

sheet. 8.6. Logs sent via the regular mail service should be addressed to: November SS CW or November SS Phone, ARRL, 225 Main St, Newington, CT 06111.


Participation Pins
