What's My Sign?

I was born as the "middle child" of our family on May 11, 1949 in Lansing Michigan, and I have three sisters and one brother. My parents certainly had their hands full with 5 children, but they also managed to work outside of our home! My father started out teaching math and then went on to being a Principal and then a Superintendent of Schools in a small town in Ohio. Then he and another man formed a consulting business in Lansing to help manufacturing companies with HR issues. He also taught at the GM Institute. My mother was a teacher and then became a stay-at-home mother. I grew up in Grand Rapids and went to Sigsbee School for kindergarten and then on to Ottawa Hills through the ninth grade. We had a very typical 50's childhood, and because we lived close to the school and Mom was always at home waiting for us, we were lucky enough to be able to go home for lunch. Then, in the 10th grade we moved to Ann Arbor where I attended Ann Arbor High School, graduating in 1976. I really enjoyed high school and did well in my studies, but what made it a little hard on me was having a graduating class of 1,300—it sure didn't give me much of a chance to get to know very many of my fellow classmates!

After graduating from high school I went to Washtenaw Community College in Ann Arbor, where I graduated in 1969 with a degree in Automotive Technology and at the age of 19, I began Teaching. I got my Teaching Degree in Vocational Education in 1975 from the University of Michigan, and then went on to attend Graduate School through the 1970's. From 1969 to 1975, I served as Sergeant (E5) in the Michigan National Guard Army Signal Corps at the 156th Signal Battalion Company D in Ann Arbor. During my stint with the Guard I become a little more familiar with radio equipment as a result of our 2 week annual training exercises every year, where we were required to set up radio communications.

I met my wife-to-be, Susie Wolter, in Suttons Bay, Michigan and after I won her heart, we were married on September 23, 1988. We don't have any children, unless you count our adopted 4-footed "furry kids". Susie doesn't have her own Ham license yet, and she really never thought about getting one, but who knows...maybe one day that will all change. After teaching Automotive Service Technology at various levels for 40 years, and developing training programs for industry for 20 years, I'm now retired. In my spare time, in addition to my Ham radio hobby, I enjoy hunting, fishing, traveling and camping with my wife.

My love for radio began when I was only about 10 years old--that's about the time I built a shortwave radio from a Heath kit and started doing a <u>lot</u> of listening! Sure enough—I was hooked! I was also lucky enough to have a Ham Radio Operator right next door. He had a Novice license and would invite me into his shack, letting me transmit code at his station while he looked on. It was so exciting and that's all it took before I caught the bug!! But you know how it is, as a kid I just couldn't afford a Ham station of my own and so time passed and I found myself involved in the world of Citizen Band. I had CB radios in my cars, my truck, and my motor home and I also had Marine Band radios in my boats. Then, one day I met some Hams who helped get me interested in the Hobby again, and encouraged me to get my license. I finally decided I'd go for it, so in July of 2011, at a VE Exam Session being held at the Georgia Institute of Technology in Atlanta, Georgia, I took and passed my Technician exam. Now, just this past June, at the Central Michigan Amateur Radio Club's Field Day event, I upgraded and got my General license! It's only been a little over a year now since I first

became a Ham, and so far, I have loved every minute of it! Some of the things I have really enjoyed were CMARC's Field Day activities this past June and their 2012 Trunk Sales this past July.

My shack is set up in a spare bedroom in my home and consists of an Icom IC-735 All Mode Transceiver connected to an MFJ-949 Tuner and an MFJ-Dipole Antenna. A couple of months ago I bought a new Yaesu FT-1900R 2-meter radio which is connected to a home made J-Pole antenna that I can throw up wherever it's needed. In my truck, I have an Icom IC-2800H Dual-Band FM Transceiver that's connected to a mag mount Dual-Band antenna so I can keep in touch when I am out on the road. And just in case there's an emergency, I have my very first HT radio, a Yaesu VX-120. You can usually find me out on 2-meters, where I like to check-in to all the various Nets on the 145.39 repeater, and I have been getting a real kick out of EchoLink and HF. I've also been thinking that Slow-Scan TV sounds like something I could get interested in eventually, too. Currently I am a member of the Central Michigan Amateur Radio Club, and I'm also still a member of the West Georgia Amateur Radio Association, the first Radio Club I ever joined. They're the ones responsible for helping me to get interested in the Hobby and for helping me to get my license.

When asked if I had any comments that I'd like to share with the Club regarding this great Hobby, I replied, "I think that the folks involved in Amateur Radio are a great bunch of people to be associated with. Everyone I meet is just plain friendly. I met a guy named Mike on the radio the other night, and he was the nicest guy. We had a great conversation, and we even exchanged information with each other, that helped each of us solve problems that we had both been having with our stations. It really doesn't get much better than that! And something else, I was drawn to CMARC from the very first time I heard about it on the air. I accidentally came across the "Breakfast Club Net" one morning and didn't know what frequency it was on, so I searched for it and finally found it again, making it a point to contact the Net Control, Don McLain/KB8RAD so I could find out all about the Club. Even though I live quite a distance away, I attended my first meeting and was hooked from then on!

There, now that we have become a little better acquainted, "What's My Sign?" My Callsign is KK4DIY and my name is Gene Brown.

Remembering Field Day

This year marks my 32nd Field Day. Wow, how time flies when your having fun! Field Day has always, been special to me because of the valuable experience gained by over-coming each new hurdle. But my special memories are of the times spent with good friends and the more experienced Hams who have helped me along the way. Many of the Hams I knew at past Field Days who are now Silent Keys. I would like to dedicate this article to my Elmers: Lyle Brooks (W8TIJ), Howard Hawkins (WB8IGU), John Huitt (K8DHN) and Bill Chapman (W8TJQ), with fond memories, 73.

It was June 1973 that year. My first Field Day. I had joined Central Michigan Amateur Radio Club as new Novice earlier that year and was invited to come along and operate Field Day. Being only sixteen years old, my mode of transport was a small motorcycle. Having first secured permission from my Mom, I repaired a small ditty bag with some extra clothes and a sleeping bag, put on my helmet and headed out to the site. The Field Day that year was a large farmers field on Stoll Rd. just northwest of Lansing, Michigan Airport.

I pulled in to find about 40 people all bustling around setting up camp. Some were pitching tents, others were digging holes, and others were putting together antennas and tower sections. The club was 4 Alfa that year and the gang had erected two full sized towers with tri-banders and half a dozen or so other wire antennas. There was wire all over the place. It was an antenna farm dream come true! Being limited to just one dipole at home, it was too much for me to behold. All those wires in the air just waiting to capture some far-away signal. I was soon grabbed and instructed to pull on this rope. They made me feel like one of the bunch.

After antennas were in place I could hear some of the stations tuning and testing their equipment. We had time for a little lunch before the starting bell I heard Morse code and Donald Duck voices from four stations in all directions, all at the same time. I was mystified. All this teamwork ticking like a fine tuned Swiss watch. I visited each tent, one by one, grabbed an eyeful and an earful at every stop.

Early evening found in the Novice tent. Howard Hawkins, who was busy making contacts on a Heathkit HW-16. He showed me the ropes and answered some of my questions about Field Day QSO procedure. He helped me gain enough confidence to answer that first CQ. I was nervous and sending a few errors, but after my initial radio fright I managed to put one in the log. A smile came to my face as Howard and I looked at each other. I didn't make too many more contacts before turning it over to a more experienced operator but the QSO's I did put a spark in me I'll never forget.

G'Day Mates!

Just got back from me local ham gathering, and the speaker was quite interesting. Had a chap there who had worked 300 countries, all with low power, or QRP as the low power ops call it. Quite impressive for only 5 watts with any aerial, yet this gent did it with all homebrew gear and wire antennas! Sure, he was retired and had plenty of time to devote to chasing DX, and yes it took nearly a decade of listening to "work em", yet this is a fine example of what can be done with low power. It is also illuminating to the budding DX chaser out there who is in need of some inspiration. Nil and Ned enjoyed his wit and wisdom as much as I did.

It illustrates that one does not need a Kilowatt and stacked Yagi Uda's at 40 metres to achieve DXCC. The 1st "rule of thumb" is , that POWER is no substitute for SKILL. I've heard many a QRPer "bust a pileup" of KW's with a bit a perseverance and cleverness. Little tricks, such as "tail ending" will often get a good operator "in the log".

The 2nd "rule of thumb" is, you have to hear em to work em. If you can't hear em you need to improve your aerial. Better aerial, equals more DX. It's just that simple.

After the meeting was adjourned, I overheard a few locals lamenting that they wished they could "work DXCC", but that their antennas were not up high enough. Another exclaimed that his antenna just didn't seem to play as well as he had envisioned when first erected. Ned asked the bunch, "Why they didn't attempt to improve on their antennas, or put them up higher in the air? "There was some mumbling and grumbling about how much work it was going to take, and was it worth the effort. Nil Current piped in with some words of wisdom of her own. "in a dipole aerial it is the feed point or point of the highest current that does most of the radiating. So it was important to get that center point as high in the air as possible where it can do the most good. Ned Novice, being a good sort, even volunteered to help with some of the "line launching and tree climbing". One gent was quick to take Ned up on his kind offer, and they made plans for the upcoming week.

Yet there were a couple gents that although they would admit their antennas could be higher, they were content to leave well enough alone. When asked why, they replied, "to much work".

Here's where I took Ned and Nil aside. I explained that there are some hams who are not inclined to find a better solution. Just as in our society, there are those who are DOER's and those who just watch. Best to spend time with the hams who are dedicated to improvement. Be it in antennas or your job or just about anything. Those who roll up their sleeves and get to it, will always win over those who stand around waiting for someone else to do it.

I smiled to myself as the kids were leaving. They were both talking about how they could improve their own antennas. This is the true ham spirit! Sure glad there are some innovators left in the hobby. Every time I think I've seen and heard it all, something new and exciting is invented and used by hams. Will it be your time to shine? We will peek in on Ned and Nil next time to see if they come up with any real ideas for their antenna farms. Till then remember, if you can't hear em, you need a better antenna.
