

I went to a forum at one of the local swaps here in the Adelaide area. The presentation was on hints for the Hams who live in aerial restricted neighborhoods, condominiums, and apartments. Very timely information as an increasing number of Hams are facing some sort of antenna restriction when they move to a new local. I often wonder why a Ham would move into a home with antenna restrictions. For some, the XYL is the deciding factor. For others, it is a convenience of having all the outdoor work and gardening done for them. Many lament and whine about not being able to use their radio "ticket", because they do not have room for an aerial, or are not allowed to put one up. More excuses than action.

' Day Mates!

There is a FB group of amateurs out there who are used to doing more with less. They call themselves QRPers. They enjoy the challenge of operating under less than ideal conditions, with low power and less than optimal aerials. So when I hear all of the gripes about not being able to get on the air for this reason or that, I say, "balderdash!" Where is that Ham spirit?

Now I know that operating with indoor antennas is not the way most Hams envision their stations. If you want to get on the air from a condo, you are going to have to use a bit of Ham ingenuity.

During the forum, several good choices were presented and then examined for pros and cons. First up was the "Mag Loop" antenna. A small diameter loop of wire held in shape by a stand, usually constructed of wood. Several variations can be used. Some use a single loop of wire or coax, others use a multi-turned loop of wire and tuned to resonance with a small capacitor. Mounted on a table top near a window or on a balcony, they may give good results with some direction in the plane of the loop. Research

"the Rock loop" by veteran QRP operator C.F. Rocky, for more information.

Another often overlooked aerial is the indoor dipole. Strung along the top of the ceiling and letting the ends droop down the corners following the shape of the room, can yield good results also. What about the "attic aerial"? Run in the rafters of the home and tuned through a tuner, they can be excellent radiators. I never had much luck with attic aerials, but I do know of several Hams that have FB signals with an attic skyhook.

What about an old mobile antenna? You know, with a magnet on the bottom? Stuck to the air conditioner in the evening, they can quite be effective.

Then we have outdoor "stealth" or hidden aerials. These will give you more bang for the buck than most any inside antenna, but disguising them is the trick.

First up is the end fed downspout antenna. Because of the shape and height of the condo, it may be quite long, or several different angles. Loaded with the use of an antenna coupler, they often will perform well on more than one band.

Then many have tried just running a small gauge wire up the side of the wall and snaked up over the rooftop and down to the end of the other side.

The half wave dipole cut from enameled copper wire, can be run vertically and "stapled" up the trunk of a tree and hidden in the branches. The coax feedline is spaded in slightly below the ground, no one will ever know it is there. You can try a vertical wire, fed at the base of the tree, and radials spaded in around the base. No trees?

Well, there's an aerial that's catching on all over disguised

as a flagpole. What homeowners officials would refuse the installation of a flagpole. They may be made of metal and fed at the base like a regular vertical, or they may be made of wood or PVC material with wire elements inside or wrapped around it. Put a pulley at the top, hoist up the "union jack" and everyone will be happy. Spade in some radials while no one is looking and you will be pleasantly surprised at the DX you will bag with this aerial.

It all comes down to experimentation. If one "wave magnet" doesn't do the job, perhaps another one will. The secret is persistence. Don't give up until you find an aerial that works for your situation. Oh, and please don't waste your hard earned cash on a prefabricated model. A bit of wire and a pair of cutters, and a VSWR meter will get you going nicely. If you have one of those fancy antenna analyzers, that's OK also, but not a necessity. Make it yourself and save time, money, and you will probably even learn a thing or two along the way. You will also gain some pride

in being able to say, "I made it myself."

Well, there you have it. Don't have room for a big tower and stacked Yagis at 30 meters? Antenna Police coming to arrest you? Give one of these "stealth" aerials a try and see where they can take you today. The RSGB puts out a few very fine reads when it comes to aerials. Look into a copy of the "Low Power Scrapbook" Chocked full of fantastic ideas to be utilized as radiators.

Remember aerial Rule # 1. If it did not come down during that last wind storm, it wasn't up high enough!

Aerial rule # 2. If they can't find an aerial, they can't complain about one! Any of the local tribesmen will tell you, Camouflage is nature's best friend. If you can't see, it it's not there.

Multi-functional component tester

Here's another marvel of Chinese engineering and manufacture — a smart component tester (http://www.banggood.com/3_5inch-Colorful-Display-Multi-functional-TFT-Backlight-Transistor-Tester-p-1083042.html) for only \$30, shipped. It identifies and characterizes

NPN and PNP transistors, capacitors, resistors, diodes (including Zener diodes), N-channel and P-channel MOSFET, IGBT, IFET, triacs, and batteries.



This isn't the first smart component tester to hit the market, but the unique thing about this unit is that it has a graphical display that not only identifies the type of component that you've connected to it, but also draws the schematic symbol of the part.
