Beginning with the June 2017 CMARC meeting, we will be meeting at our **new location** at the Lansing Mason Ambulance Training Facility.

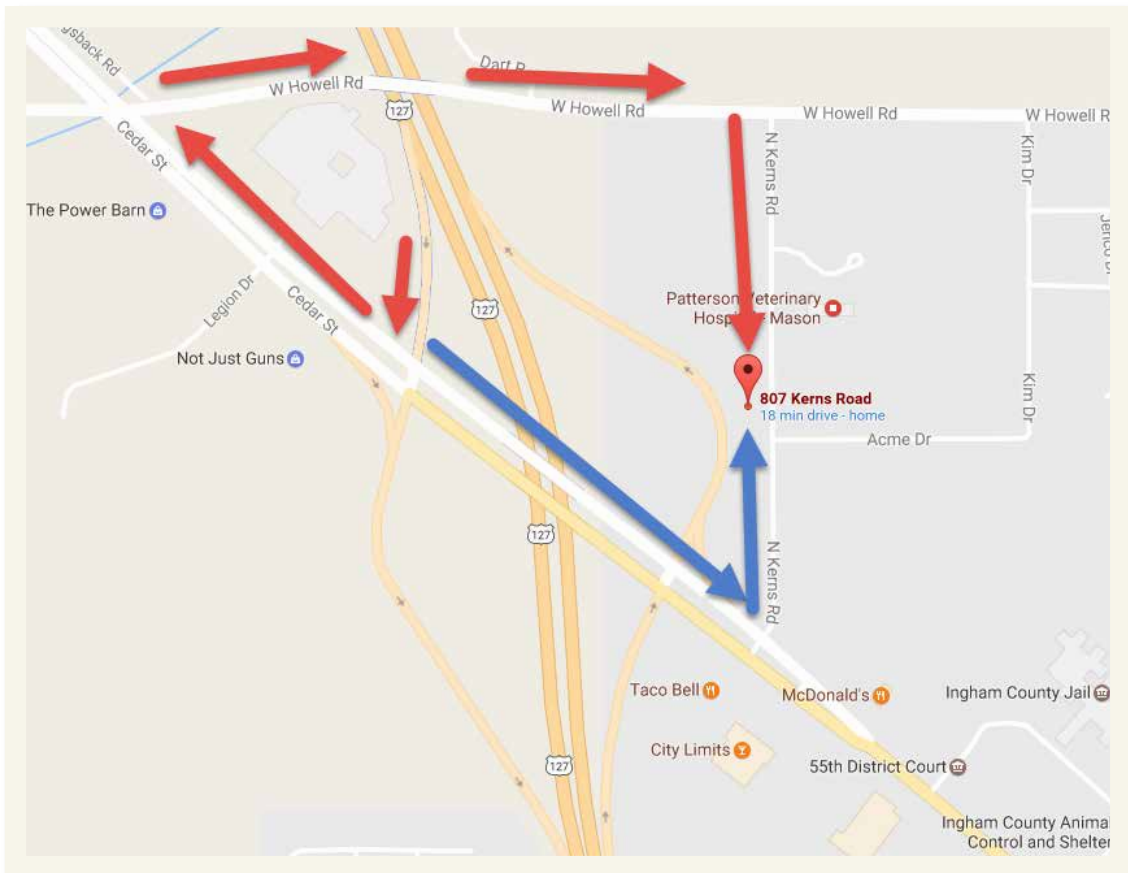

FOOD DONATIONS:

FOOD:

1. My XYL Maribeth is working on a sign up list of food items which we will have at the June meeting.

ICSD TRAILER:

1. The Ingham County Sheriff Department trailer is in need of some repairs. It is not certain at this point if we will be able to use it this year. We are working with the county on it. We may need to provide a couple tents or seek trailers to borrow if it is not available.

PHOTOGRAPHER & PIO:

1. I sent Kenny Hazlett N8BVV an email to confirm if he is available for Field Day operations again. Will update at the meeting.

POWER:

1. Randy Williams/KD8MOK has volunteered to exercise the State of Michigan Emergency Operations diesel generator again this year at our Field Day. I believe we should also exercise "Ol' Yeller" as well to ensure its operational status.

SITE SELECTION:

1. With many thanks to Ed Hude/WA8QJE, Rayner Park in Mason has been secured for the next three years as our Field Day location. Randy/KD8MOK and myself will act as site chairs. The city closes the gates at approximately dusk each day, Randy or I will have a key to the gate.

SITE SAFETY:

1. Not sure if he knows it or not but I've volunteered Bob Berger/K8RDN to be our Safety Manager at Field Day.

STATION CHAIR PERSONS:

1. HF CW: Gregg Mulder/WB8LZG has volunteered to chair the HF CW station, John Tyree has again offered the services of his travel trailer for it's shelter.
2. HF SSB-1: John Hosford/KC8QZB has volunteered to chair HF SSB station.
3. HF SSB-2/DIGITAL: Unconfirmed if Matt Miller/KD8OOS is on board officially yet or not, but I should have this confirmed by meeting time.
4. SIX METER FM: At the time of this email, we do not have a confirmed Six Meter FM chair but I've heard tell of one individual interested. More at the June meeting.
5. GOTA: (See below in Bonus Points section)

VE TESTING:

1. VE Testing is scheduled for 11:00 am again this year. John Doornhaag/KD8NNQ will be in charge.

WIFI, MESH, LOGGING SOFTWARE, LAPTOPS, INTERNET ACCESS:

1. This area is a work in progress, not certain if we will have laptops to borrow or if the station chairs will be using their own. It's been very helpful for the SSB stations to be able to see where the other is working to prevent dupes etc. Randy KD8MOK and Matt KD8OOS are the listed chair persons in this area, Last year I was able to get a donated cable modem from Wide Open West so that we had internet access at the site connected thru our private WiFi. 4. TRAFFIC HANDLED: Anyone interested in checking into a net and passing/receiving traffic please contact me.
5. GET ON THE AIR COACH (GOTA): At the time of this email, we do not have a confirmed GOTA captain. More on this later.
6. PIO / INFORMATION TABLE: This is part of the setup/tear down tasks outlined below in "Help Wanted".

HELP WANTED!! :

1. FIELD DAY EQUIPMENT: : We typically pick up the canopies and other Field Day equipment beginning at 7:00am on Saturday. Once transported to the site, setup begins at approx 8:00am. Help at these two times/locations will be greatly appreciated! We also will need tear down assistance beginning just after 2:00pm on Sunday once the contest is concluded.
2. PIO/INFORMATION TABLE: : All participants, and any visitors to the site should be directed first to the sign in book. We have some ARRL pamphlets and brochures that we place here as well. This will be adjacent to the GOTA station setup or within the GOTA shelter depending on room.
3. SITE RESTORATION/CLEAN UP: One thing I'm proud to say about all of our Field Day operations through the years has been that the site is always in better shape after Field Day than before. We have one or two people walk the site and pick up trash (whether it's ours or not) and look for the errant tool or HF rig that may have been left behind. In 2015 the year that "the rains came and didn't leave" we made a bit of a mess of the grounds. But on the Monday following we went back and raked out the grass and flattened out the minor ruts that had been left behind. So a couple volunteers with these tasks in mind would be great.

GOTA COACH NEEDED! :

What is the "GOTA" station? The GOTA Station "is an opportunity for any Technician or Novice licensees, newly licensed amateurs, other generally inactive licensees, and non-licensed

persons to experience first-hand the fun of amateur radio by allowing them to GET ON THE AIR (GOTA)." What does it take to be the GOTA Coach? Like any other Field Day station, the basic equipment needs apply: Antenna, Transceiver, Table, chairs, shelter. This equipment is already available. All that's needed is the coach! The GOTA Coach should be of General Class or higher to take full advantage of any band openings. You do NOT have to operate the GOTA station the entire weekend. Typically we select a four hour (or longer) time slot on Saturday to offer the opportunity for others to check out Field Day and Amateur Radio in general. 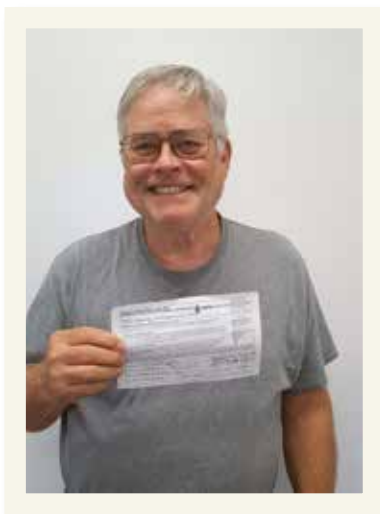

Growing the Ranks vs. Growing the Enjoyment

Because I teach amateur radio classes and publish a series of popular amateur radio license study guides (www.kb6nu.com/study-guides/), I often get kudos for “growing the ranks.” In fact, Gordon West, WB6NOA, told me this just last week, when he stopped by the booth I was in at the Dayton Hamvention. I’m paraphrasing a little, but after telling me that he’s heard good things about my study guides, he said something like, “You’re doing good work in helping get more people into ham radio.”

People say that as if this is—or should be—the ultimate goal of teaching a license class. While this may be one of the goals, if that’s your primary goal, I think that you’re barking up the wrong tree.

In a way, creating more hams is selfish. If there are more licensed amateur radio operators, they say, then amateur radio will have more political clout with the FCC and with Congress, making it easier to pass legislation like the Amateur Radio Parity Act. While this may certainly help the new ham down the line, its main thrust is to reduce restrictions on those who are currently hams.

My goal in teaching amateur radio classes isn’t to create more hams. Instead, my goal is to help more people have fun with ham radio. The first step in helping people have fun with ham radio is, of course, helping them get their license. I do that by publishing my study guides and teaching ham classes.

The next step, and I’m only really getting started on this right now, is to help people learn what they need to know to become better ham radio operators. That’s why I got a little excited when I saw the article, “Making a Good hobby Better Through Post-Licensing Enrichment” by Tim Busch, NoCKR in the latest issue of *Radio Waves*, the ARRL’s email newsletter for amateur radio instructors.

In the article, Tim describes several activities that his club encourages, including a “new ham net” and the Field Day GOTA station, but he also details a program of “mini classes” that will teach specific skills related to ham radio. These include:

- * Programming Radios and Getting on the Air
- * Soldering 101
- * Multimeter 101
- * Build and Use a Roll-Up J-Pole Antenna
- * Build and Use a Satellite Antenna
- * Foxhunts
- * Operating Digital Modes: IRLP, AllStar, D-Star, EchoLink, etc.
- * Remote Operation
- * Software-Defined Radios
- * Transitioning from VHF/UHF to HF Operating
- * Chasing Awards
- * Learn CW
- * Contesting

Tim writes, “Each class is intended to be no more than two hours at a sitting, so they can be held before a monthly club meeting. The variety of subject matter allows many club members to get involved in leading a topic. Materials kits are prepared in advance, so students walk away with practical items they can use at home.”

I think this is a great set of classes, and I plan to try some of these in the fall. A couple of other topics that occur to me are:

- * Power Supplies 101
- * Mobile Operation 101
- * ARRL 101
- * RFI/TVI 101

Helping new hams—and old hams—have more fun with amateur radio is a lot more satisfying to me than just “growing the ranks.” It would be nice to say that we have a million licensed radio amateurs in the U.S., but I think it would be a lot more valuable to the hobby to say that a larger percentage of licensed hams were active and enjoying ham radio. I know that, for me, increasing the number of active, engaged hams would be more personally satisfying than simply creating a lot of new licensees. ■

Let's Build a Field Day Antenna

After many years of having fun at Field Day, I decided to comment about some Field Day antennas that I have seen used. (and misused!)

One of the popular multiband antennas is the trap vertical. Usually ground mounted with radials, it makes a good usable

antenna for many bands. It assembles easily and can be taken down into small sections for storage. The vertical radiates in all directions, but has no gain compared to dipoles and other antennas.

Without a doubt, the most popular Field Day antenna is the dipole. Fed in the Inverted Vee configuration, it too has good coverage in all directions. The important thing is to get the center up at least 30 – 40 feet in the air. The downside, it's only good for one band. (or odd multiples thereof) Full-wave loops are fine and give some gain over a dipole, but more supports are required.

The most popular Field Day Bands are 80m, 40m, and 20m. So ideally we would like to cover all three bands. How to do it? Trap Dipole. Just like the multi-band vertical uses traps to separate the portions actively used, we will make traps for a dipole. I found an old MFJ model and decided to “copy” it.

1st things 1st. We need a good center insulator. You can Homebrew one with an SO239 connector a few pieces of PVC and some “eye” hooks. However, there are some prefab commercial jobs out there that do a bang up job for a good price. (Budwig, MFJ, Alpha Delta, to name a few)

Now that we have a center insulator it's time to cut some wire. Cut two lengths of stranded copper wire 17 feet long. These will be the 20m elements. Solder these securely to both sides of the center conductor. Use 16 ga. or larger for more power than 100 watts. (Figure 1 shows an MFJ style)

Now let's build the traps. 1st cut 2, 1 1/2 “ PVC tubing pieces to 3 1/2” long. Drill 1/4” holes all the way through on both ends about 1/2’ from the ends. Wind 33 turns of # 16 to 20 ga. enameled wire and terminate with a lug on the ends.

Drill a couple small holes to put 2 small screws to hold the wire taught while winding. (Figure 2)

Here's a picture of the 40m trap. (Figure 3)

Now take the 17-foot wires and thread them through the 1/4” holes and attach them to the lugs after MEASURING 16 1/2 feet. Solder them and Secure with 1/2 x 8-32 machine screws and nuts. Attach 6’ of stranded copper wire to the other side of the trap and solder.

Then make the 80m traps from PVC, only cut them 7” long with the holes drilled 1/2 “ from the ends. Wind 67 turns of enameled wire to form the coil. Attach the open end of the 6-foot wires to the 80m traps, terminate with an insulator on both sides. Attach a length of coax and your ready to test. You will have to raise this antenna up to about the 25-foot level to see where to “prune” ends so it will resonate in the sections of 40 and 80m that you want. It will cover the entire 20m band with under 2 to 1 SWR. Proper tuning of the other two bands should get you 150 Kcs on 40m, and about 80 Kcs of 2 to 1 band width on 80m in the portion you tune for. Properly tuned, it should give you good three band coverage with

a db or 2 of gain over a vertical antenna. The best part is “rolling ur own” will only set you back about \$25 with all new parts. New commercial trap dipoles are running \$50 –\$100.(some more) Naturally if you have a well-stocked “junk box” you can cut costs even further. The best part is, it can all be rolled up in a very small space and stored easily. Ready for your next portable deployment. Is this the BEST antenna for Field Day? Well, maybe or maybe not, depending on your needs, space, and desire for a good antenna for reliable communications. Yagi’s, Quads, Loops, Rhombics, Phased Verticals, Bi Squares, Long wires, Double Bazzokas, 8JK’s, Colinears, Lazy H’s and Bruce arrays will all have more gain but are more complicated to build and to set up and store.

I’m not going to make any claims as to which antenna is best. I’ll let you experiment on your own for one that works best for you. As for me, I’m kinda partial to the Bruce Arrays that we’ve been using at the CMARC Field Days the past few years. It’s hard to beat five elements on 20 meters!

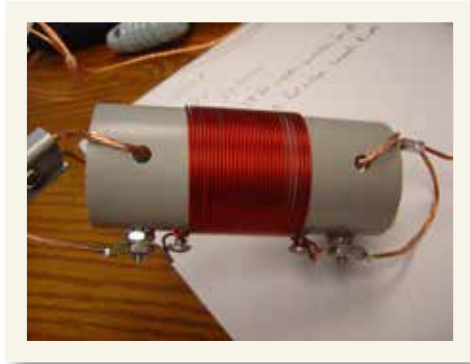

Date: May 6, 2017

Time: 5:30 PM

OPENING:

1. President Tom Rocheleau/WA8WPI called the meeting to order at 5:38 pm.
2. The following Board members were in attendance: Tom Rocheleau/WA8WPI, Russ Fitzgerald/N8FZ, John Doornhaag/KD8NNQ, Ted Sadilek/WA8MFQ, and Chris Ranes/NS8Q

CLUB MOVE & TOWER/ANTENNA WORK:

1. The Club move has been completed except for taking down the two towers (incl. the VHF/UHF vertical, HF tri-band, and 30m vertical). The wire antenna was taken down the day of the move.
2. The hole in the wall has been plugged with screen and two layers of spray-in-foam. Thank you Ted for purchasing the foam and John for plugging the hole.
3. We need to find somebody with a gin-pole to help us take the towers down.
4. John is going to contact Ron Harger/WD8BCS to see if he has a gin-pole we can use or know where we can find one.
5. John offered the use of his trailers to help transport tower pieces.
6. John also will bring his saw and a generator to power allowing us to cut the tower legs.
7. The date chosen to take down the towers is Saturday, May 20th at 9:00 AM.
8. We are looking at a couple different Saturday's at the beginning of June to go in and do a good cleaning at our new location.

501(c)3 STATUS UPDATE:

1. Tom was able to obtain the last document we needed to finalize the paperwork. We were missing the original Articles of Incorporation filed with the State of Michigan, and he was able to find them at the Office of Licensing and Regulatory Affairs. The cost to retrieve the documents was \$20. The document was faxed to Hector at BizCharity who is filing our paperwork for us.
2. Clyde mentioned there are grants available for our club to take advantage of once we obtain our non-profit status.

HAMFEST UPDATE:

1. Dan/KD8YDE is not going to finish his food license exam before Hamfest get here. John mentioned Terry, a trainer he knows from Speedway, will sit with us during this year's Hamfest to make sure we are covered on everything pertaining to food safety.
2. All positions have been covered except for food. Dan/KD8YDE will be there to cook when he can and John /KD6KCX said he is willing to help cook to take the load off of Dan.
3. We still need a person to be the Food Chairperson. The main responsibilities of the Chairperson are to pick up food items and generally oversee the "kitchen". We are going to use the same food quantities as we did last year, except we will be offering a "non-pork" option due to requests made last year.
4. Clyde is working on a master binder so if someone else takes over the Hamfest organization, they will have something to work with.
5. Clyde mentioned he talked to somebody at the Summit in Dimondale who like to work with non-profit organizations. If our Hamfest ever expands beyond what our current location can handle, the Summit might be a possible location for us to move to. If we want to sell our own food, we would be required to pay \$50 or we can elect to have our attendees purchase concessions there and we will not have to pay anything extra. We would only miss out on any profit coming from concession sales.
6. Clyde is working on building up our list of vendors for this year's event.
7. We still do not have a Grand Prize for our drawing. We need somebody to donate a radio this year or donate the funds to help purchase a radio.
8. There is a \$50 gift certificate coming from DX Engineering with other ARRL gift certificates coming as well.

FIELD DAY UPDATE:

1. Brian Wellwood/KD8ONC will be unable to sponsor the GOTA station this year due to traveling out of the country.
2. We need to find somebody who can supply a complete station for us to use.
3. The club currently owns two 8-foot tables, two folding tables, and sixteen folding chairs. Because we are no longer able to use tables and chairs from the Salvation Army, we are asking our memberships to bring tables and chairs for the Club picnic during Saturday afternoon. If you can help in any way with this need please let someone on the Board know.
4. Clyde will be working as a "greeter" to help welcome people to Field Day, show them around, and answer any questions they may have.

CLUB OPENHOUSE:

1. We are discussing the possibility of having an open house at our new club location during the month of September.
2. We want to make it late enough in the year so the MSU students and members can join us.
3. Russ will be the Chairman of the event, and will be the main planner and organizer. Besides having a cookout, he would like to put on a demonstration of the use of different Ham Radio modes.

4. **Tom made the motion that Russ become the Chairman, Ted seconded the motion, and the motion passes.**
5. The open house will be on a Saturday.
6. The August meeting will remain the second Friday of the month as usual.

MISCELLANEOUS:

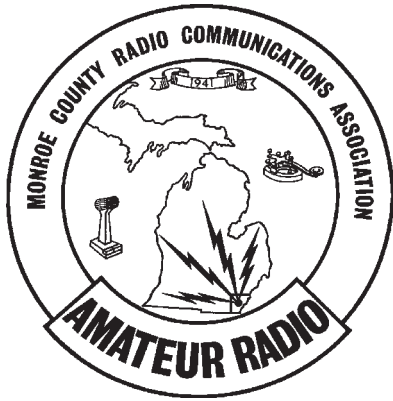

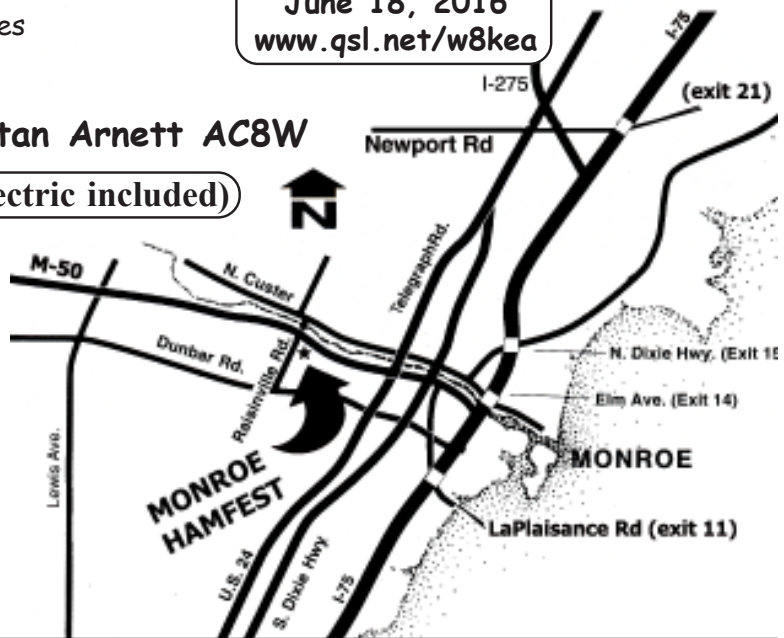
